- B. Whether to elect Don Cable as a second Honorary Vice President.

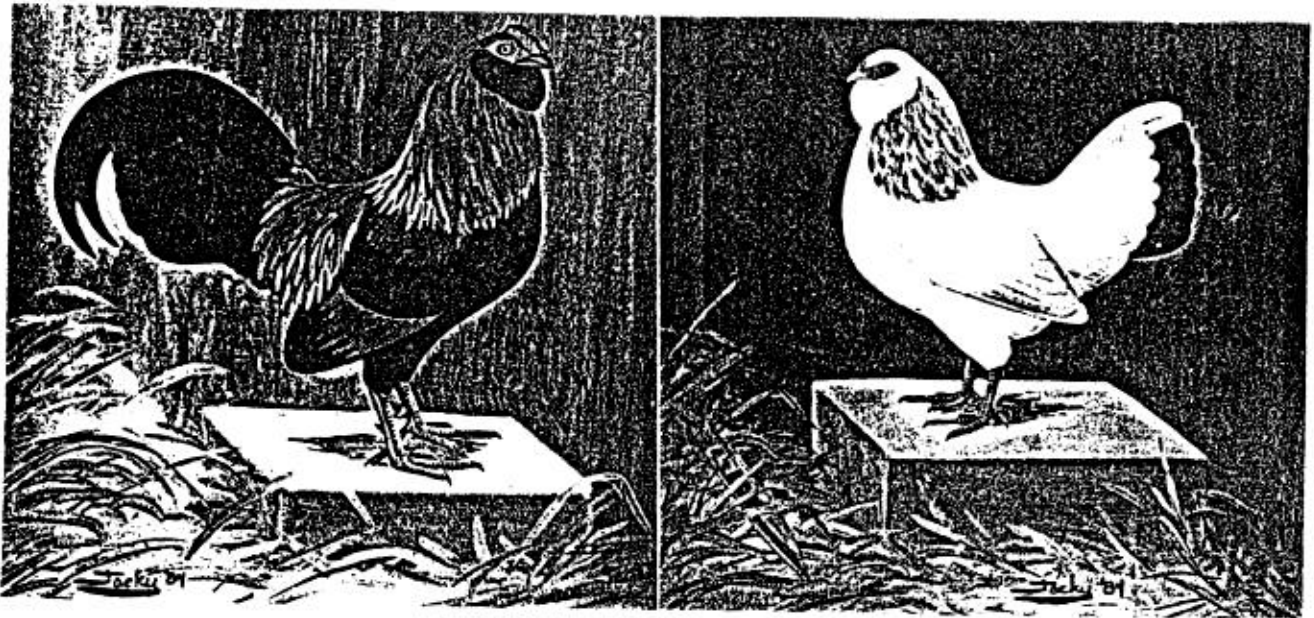
If any member has other items to be voted upon this fall it should be brought to the attention of the club president and acting secretary immediately.

AMERAUCAANA BANTAMS

THE 1984 NATIONAL MEET - SOME OBSERVATIONS

The Wisconsin State Poultry Breeders hosted our 1984 national meet at the Wisconsin state fairgrounds near Milwaukee on the first weekend of October. A total of 29 bantams were exhibited by four midwestern members. While the numbers were disappointing, enthusiasm ran high and several new memberships were secured. Those of us who attended the annual meeting were treated to a report from J. Ralph Brazleton about his pioneering efforts many years ago with what are now Ameraucana bantams. The following critique is strictly opinion and is not intended as criticism of either exhibitors or the judge, Eugene Barnard, who did a fine job.

Sixteen whites were shown, and all four exhibitors represented. The one hen and one cock were good specimens of the breed but neither were in the peak of condition and the male was extremely wild. Tail carriage was correct in both birds at about 40 degrees above the horizontal; tails were also reasonably well spread in both, a feature lacking in many of the whites shown.

Four white cockerels were entered plus one to make up a trio. Most were rather large, had oversized combs, and had more or less brassiness across back and wings. As with many bantam males, wing carriage was generally too low.

From the white pullet class came best of breed and reserve of variety. The 1st place bird showed well on this particular day, displaying correct body carriage, tail angle and spread, correct size, and very good muffs and beard. She could be faulted, however, for lacking depth of body, being a trifle long in tail, and too light in eye color. The standard calls for an eye of reddish bay, something difficult to achieve in whites. Some are nearly yellow (like this bird), others very dark brown, and some are red.

Among the colored birds were a very nice pair of blues, a cockerel and a pullet. Both appeared a little too young for exhibition; another month would have put them at a higher state of finish. The male showed no red in the hackle and was, I thought, the best in overall type of the male birds shown. He was correctly disqualified for white shanks, but could serve well as a sire of future winners.

Three black pullets were shown. The 1st and 2nd finishers showed good muff & beard development, but the 3rd lacked in that area. All three appeared to be by the shape of their combs, heterozygous for single/pea combs (as did the blues). Again, these birds could be used well in the proper breeding program, but lack potential as individuals in the exhibition hall. Size, color, and type were not bad. Tail spread and angle could stand a little improvement.

Next, four blue-wheatens were exhibited, two pullets and two cockerels. Judged best of variety, and properly so, was a pullet showing good type and with reasonably sufficient blue coloring in her tail. She was just a little large and a little uneven in wheaten top color, a common problem among wheaten and blue-wheaten females. Reserve of variety went to the other pullet, a smaller bird but quite immature. She also displayed very good tail color. First cockerel went to a bird with a coarse comb, a rather abrupt break between back line and tail, and a little striping in the hackle. The other cockerel was disqualified for shank color (white). The latter was a real showy, small bird - but a rather obvious cross with Old English game. He had excellent plumage coloration but was not representative of the Ameraucana breed in type. He could be mated back to pure Ameraucana females to improve size and color in the breed - if one has the patience to segregate out impure shank color, muffs, comb, and type over a period of several generations.

Finally, the wheatens were represented by only one cockerel and three pullets shown by two exhibitors. The cockerel was obviously immature as his muffs had not yet turned fully from wheaten to black. More age might have brought out better type, but he again had some hackle striping. He was judged reserve of variety. All three pullets had quite good type and finish, though the 3rd place bird had not reddened in the comb yet. She was the best colored bird of the three, being a light creamy shade of wheaten, but lacked quite enough black in tail and wings. The second and first place pullets were superior to her in the black sections of plumage, but were uneven in top color across the back and were a bit darker than the desired shade. (one tends to look for the Old English shade of wheaten until the Ameraucana standard requirements are studied in-detail)

The first place wheaten pullet was judged reserve of breed, a choice not too far off the mark, as she had very nice Ameraucana female type.

Once again, the above is not intended as any form of criticism. It is hoped the foregoing might help someone in his or her selection process, whether for breeding or for exhibition.
