I was awakened this fine cool (yes, cool) morning to none other than the sound of rain drops. Upon rising a while later, I discovered that's all there was - just a few drops. I just walked to the mailbox ($\frac{1}{2}$ mile round trip) and the sand in the driveway is just as sandy as it was yesterday. It is much cooler, however. Only 70°. That is one consolation. From what I hear on the news and see by the weather map in the paper the whole country is suffering, some parts worse than others. There isn't a lot one can do but struggle along and pray "This too shall pass".

I was at the co-op to get feed yesterday and found already the cost has risen 50¢ per bag and the guys are predicting nothing but doom/gloom along with rising prices. It would probably be wise if one could to stash feed away. I imagine I should be happy I have just three horses to feed instead of five. We've been feeding hay all of June, there is just no pasture. That means five extra months of feeding hay - cost of hay is up because the first cutting was scanty at best and no rain means no second cutting.

This bulletin is late due to a string of bad luck for your secretary along with the advent of tourist season which brings longer and harder hours of work. I went from a smashed up car (no, noone was hurt - just the beautiful Sunbird) to no car for a month while the insurance company fooled around (DC you know how that is, don't you?) to a new '87 Jeep Comanche 4x4 truck with cap. Perfect for N. winters, chicken shows, hauling feed, etc. Right? Wrong!! The Jeep developed an engine noise that is serious, so it is in the shop 40 miles away getting the main part of a new engine at Jeep's expense, thank goodness, for at least two weeks. That means two weeks of trying somehow to get to and from work. Work is only 8 miles from my house but with no vehicle it may as well be 8000 miles. In the meantime, I managed to fall through a broken board on our back step and have a severely bruised left leg from mid-thigh to toes. The leg needs to be iced each night. Not much one can do lying flat with a bag of ice on one's leg. I skipped the icing business Sunday night and did I pay for it Monday...swelling and pain...it was horrid. So since it is Tuesday and a day off, not time to ice the leg and I'm totally stranded, I can direct my attention to you folks...the ever growing ABC'ers.

Also in this bulletin will be important election information. We are due for an officers election this fall.

MORE DOOM AND GLOOM

I just wanted to pass this latest information along. I had three attacks on my bantam cages this spring. The attacks led to much damage, loss of birds and a puzzle! It always happened in the daytime when noone was here. Birds just killed, not eaten even partially, cages ripped apart, chewed on, boards and wire ripped off. It had to be something big, mean and strong.

The only cage that escaped entry ("the thing" tried really hard) was one that had hardware cloth for wire instead of chicken wire. A lesson here, maybe? The only bantam hen I have left is the one that was in that cage. She was badly frightened, tore off a toe nail, blood all over, but she and her mate were otherwise unharmed. She must have gotten over her ordeal as she laid two eggs this week. First of the season for her.

All we could think of was that it must be a coon. But I kept thinking..no, it happens in the daytime. We did some research and found that if a coon has babies she will hunt in the daytime. That still didn't seem right. Only one bird was missing out of three separate attacks. The rest were dead or died later with just bite marks on their backs. Several cock birds escaped - minus their tail feathers. "Golden Boy" and a Mike Gilbert wheaten, three MG pullets escaped and hung around under an old building for a week or so. I decided to let them be free that way they could run or fly away if need be. Wrong again! Found them dead, also.

By this time, I'm really upset so I wrote Don Cable. I knew he had lost birds to coons. Just heard from DC last week and Thank You, Don. Your invaluable information has solved the puzzle. Don said from the condition of the birds (damped mouth look to the bodies I described it) it wasn't coons at all but a big dog or dogs. Coons virtually tear the birds apart - wing here, leg there, etc. He had a team of dogs attack, a German Shepherd and a small mutt. The larger dog did the breaking in, the smaller dog barking and scaring. The the two just running down the birds and one big bite through the back.

Exactly what I found. Funny you should mention a shepherd, Don. Just last Tuesday in the early evening I was cooking dinner, big chicken commotion outside. Went to the door and saw a big shepherd sniffing about. I yelled for Rex and he ran for his gun and shot in the air.

I thought this information important because if you should have your chickens attacked you may have a better idea as to what the attacker is. I had set a live trap and was waiting for July 15 to get my friend and his coon dogs over here. In Michigan you can't run dogs between April 15 and July 15. The animals are raising their families (great). Animal control and DNR, all those kind of folks will tell you to set traps. That's what they told me anyway.

Remember, coons tear bodies apart; dogs (ones that are out to kill) just give one good chomp and that's it. Plus this dog or dogs couldn't get into the cage with hardware cloth, an all wooden cage it did.

My bantam population is down to three cock birds and one hen, but I do have some eggs in the incubator. Hopefully they will hatch. I do have four new large fowl families - about 40 chicks. So onward and upward. JT

ELECTION

Because the AMERAUCANA BREEDERS CLUB has an election coming up and I'm not sure how the nominations are going at this time I thought this information might be helpful.

The States for each District is listed in this Newsletter. Please take a few minutes and review this list so you will be familiar with the District in which you live. And, please, read your AMERAUCANA BREEDERS CLUB HANDBOOK. Know the responsibilities of the officers and the Directors. The club needs you and your support. Nominate someone you know will be a good representative for and of the club.

AMERAUCANA BREEDERS CLUB current officers and Directors are eligible for re-election but will not be automatically be placed on the ballot unless they are nominated and agree to run again.

Vice Presidents hold a lifetime position but it is an honorary one. I can find nothing in the Constitution where it states the VP's can't hold other offices ... such as District Directors

Officers and directors shall be elected by mail ballot. **You must** be a paid up member to receive the ballot and vote. Ballots will be mailed with the Fall Newsletter. The ballots must be marked and mailed to the Election Commissioner by a specified deadline. Your vote is necessary. Tallies will be announced in the Winter Newsletter. New officers will assume their duties January 1, 1989.

One of the things I miss about not having bantams at present is hens with their chicks. About this time each year I would close down the incubator and let each hen hatch out a bunch of late chicks. Having a few of these little families out on the lawn in the evening was always worth the bother of dealing with broody hens and I have spent many pleasant hours relaxing with a cool drink and watching the antics of a mother hen and her offspring.

It is all too easy to get into the game of hatching as many chicks as possible, cranking them out in such numbers that it soon becomes a chore rather than one of the more rewarding activities in this great pastime. The trick is to produce sufficient numbers to meet your needs and enjoy the process rather than becoming obsessed with having a bantam factory to produce that elusive champion.

Stop and smell the roses. Enjoy!

There is a move afoot among an element in the A.P.A. to have the standard illustrations of bantams reduced in size to cut the printing costs. One of the explanations for this move by a former APA bigwig was to facilitate "quick and positive identification".

This might be sound reasoning for a field guide, but most of us know a Cochin from an Ameraucana, and a standard is something to be studied at length - illustrations as well as the text - not for identification.

I would like to have the ABC go on record as opposed to reducing the bantam illustrations in forthcoming editions of the APA Standard of Perfection. If you agree, please contact your APA Director ... before the next edition.

I wrote to that Tanner Co. in MO about those Micro-barrier containers twice and never did hear anything. Curtis Yeatts of VA sent me a page out of one of his Pigeon Journals that contained an ad explaining all about the container and the cost (\$19.95 plus shipping). After talking to Ed Mongold at the Centreville Show, it seems we best not get too excited about the containers. Ed told me he called the Tanner Co. and they were very emphatic that the containers were for pigeons only and we would cause problems for the pigeon people if we used them for poultry. I guess that's the end of that brilliant brain storm...unless Duane Urch has more information. Duane?

I know that several of you are waiting on eggs from me - large fowl. I simply have not been getting very many or they are hiding them successfully. I will however, continue to search and send along any I do find.

Curtis Yeatts had great luck. Of the 18 or so he raised of mine last year he hatched this year around 38 out of 44.

Beverly Fledderjohann got two dozen eggs at Centreville and hatched 18.

Mary Lou, I believe, also hatched 18 out of 24. I mailed those UPS Second Day air to her - from Michigan to Missouri. So it does work. I think the biggest secret is taking them right from the hen house to the packing box, then to UPS. I've found UPS much better than Express Mail - #1 cheaper; #2 UPS delivers to your door. No eggs lying around at the P.O.

Bernard and I had a great time at the Centreville Show. Came away feeling very pleased he got AOCCCL on a white cockerel. An AM actually on Champion's Row!!!
