## ANOTHER LOOK AT WHEATEN

The Wheaten Ameraucana bantam class at the Ohio National Show was good by any measure and brought forth important examples of just where we are headed in the development of this popular variety. Although every bird placed reflected the uniformity of prerequisites necessary to be considered representative of the variety and in spite of the fact that they all had a common ancestry within this past decade, there was just enough variety in type, station and color to prove interesting and a subtle reflection of the breeders involved.

It is my opinion that females in this variety are well ahead of males in virtually every phase of development, yet males are frequently picked best of breed and/or variety due primarily I believe, to a lack of basic knowledge and understanding of our standard by judges. This is perhaps understandable due to the recent admission of the breed to Bantam Standard, and as time passes and more Ameraucanas are exhibited, judges will become more familiar with the breed and hopefully, the problem will correct itself. It is important then, that we exhibit our birds in order to increase exposure and thus understanding of the breed.

A fundamental problem lies in the description of wheaten desired in the Ameraucana bantam female as opposed to the wheaten color called for in other bantam breeds. Judging instructions in Bantam Standard indicate the wheaten variety females should be carefully checked and cut for light creamy top color in hackle, back, cushion and wing, whereas our standard would encourage light creamy top color in all of these sections except hackle. The wheaten Ameraucana bantam standard says, "Plumage: Refer to wheaten color description, except light creamy females which provide the greatest contrast between male and female are to be preferred." It is up to us to point out this major difference to judges before they handle the wheaten Ameraucana classes at our club meets.

Type and size in wheatens continues to improve in both sexes in spite of the fact that type seems to suffer in many of the smaller specimens. This is especially true of males who tend to gaminess, harder feather and a tendency to skimpy facial feathering as size is reduced. It is much easier to get a tiny, typey female with full beard and muffs. We want a tail on both male and female that is well spread with good feather width, so do not breed from narrow, whip-tailed females, nor those that carry their tails too high; we want 40° above horizontal.

Black in wings and tail can be elusive, particularly as birds age, so if your pullets lack this necessary color, you can be sure that they will not be any better in this respect as hens. However, this loss of pigment will vary from one individual to another so that soundness of color in these sections can be selected for. Unfortunately, those females with the soundest wing and tail color are frequently those with the darkest hackle color as well, so progress on both fronts becomes something of a standoff since wheaten, not chestnut is required in hackle.

The wheaten variety remains one of our most productive varieties with good blue shell color as well. Judicious use of blue wheaten as an outcross will not only help sustain this productivity, but will enhance quality and viability on both sides of this mating.

Finally, it is staying power that is the hallmark of the wheaten variety, again, particularly on the female side. While males typically shorten up in tail after their cockerel year, sometimes dramatically so, females are somehow less affected, often improving with age. The wheaten hen which illustrates both the Ameraucana Bantam Handbook and the 6th edition of Bantam Standard for example, will be five years old this spring.
