## President - Michael Muenks

Greetings all! I hope your breeding and hatching season is going well. As I write this report, the cold of the mid-February polar vortex is just subsiding here in central Missouri. Sadly, we lost the well at the beginning of the deep freeze, had frozen pipes, and are still waiting for the drains to thaw. The Ameraucana came through the weather mostly unscathed.



You may be surprised to see me writing as president of the Ameraucana Alliance since I was elected as a club director in the fall of 2020. Our dear friend and club president John Blehm resigned as club president in late January 2021. The remaining board of directors elected me as president in early February. I would like to publicly thank John for all his past and his ongoing leadership and service to the club and the breed. Everyone needs a break from time to time and the board will continue to build on all the great work he has done for the club as well as that of the outgoing board members. John is one of the members of the team organizing the National Meet at the Central Indiana Poultry Show on October 16, 2021, so he is still deeply involved in Club activities for which I am grateful.

The turn of the New Year saw the seating of a new Board of Directors for the Ameraucana Alliance based on the fall club election results. Early in the month of January Royce Van Blaricome resigned as a director and Jeff Sonsalla stepped up to fill the open directors spot. John Blehm resigned as president as noted above. For those of you who do not know me, I have lived in central Missouri for most of my life. My first introduction to poultry was at five years of age when my parents consented to me getting Muscovy ducks from my Grandpa so I could be just like him. I got my first barnyard bantams around the age of ten and the next year in 1981 I hatched my first blue egg layers from an assortment of hatching eggs from a local exotic poultry keeper in 1982. Two black bantam pullets hatched from the two blue eggs included in the mix. The enjoyment of blue egg layers led to an order of wheaten blue egg layers from Marti Poultry in Windsor, Missouri in 1984.

As with all poultry people, I was drawn back to keeping chickens in the late 1990s as a newlywed after purchasing a small farm in California, MO. The chicken coop was attended to before the house was fully moved into and the first bantam hatchery Easter Eggers arrived that first spring in 1998. Not long after that I connected with members of what was called the Ameraucana Breeders Club at that time. I served in several positions of the Club leadership in the first decade of the new century. During that time, I had breeding pens for all 8 bantam and large fowl varieties and was a part of the early efforts to breed lavender bantam Ameraucana.

Early fall of 2010 saw the disbursement of my Ameraucana when I moved my family to the Chicago area for a new job/career opportunity. The move was short-lived and lasted only a year. By the spring of 2012 I was working to find Ameraucana only to have those efforts suspended when my father was involved in a terrible car wreck that fall that left him, after a nine-month recovery from the physical injuries from the accident, in need of constant care due to a traumatic brain injury from which there was no recovery. I remained a member of the Club during that time and helped with things as I could but dedicated my time to the care of my family.

Now, after the passing of both my parents and with two daughters almost out of high school, I am honored to serve the Ameraucana Alliance, keepers of Ameraucana, and the Ameraucana breed.

The new year has been full of exciting announcements. I would like to extend a hearty congratulations to this year's Ameraucana Lifetime Achievement Award recipient, Duane Schroeder, from New Castle, Indiana as announced by club president John Blehm on the forum on February 9, 2021. Duane joined our club in 2009 and is probably best known for his large fowl wheaten & blue wheaten Ameraucana. He recently retired and suspended his work with poultry to enjoy a couple of years of hiking in the National Parks with his wife. Duane is still an Alliance member and we look forward to the return of Schroeder Poultry in a few years.

Duane served as a club director in 2013, promoted our breed and club by publishing articles, supported & encouraged others by contributing to our Ameraucana Forum, bred to improve his favorite varieties and helped get "standard" Ameraucana into the hands of others. Thank you, Duane, and congratulations!



I would like to extend my congratulations to Keirsten Klaus the first Ameraucana Alliance Master Junior Exhibitor of Ameraucana Chickens. It is quite a milestone for Keirsten and the club. I was privileged to see some of her Ameraucana exhibited at the Southern National in October of 2020. Well done Keirsten!

In other club news, as you are planning for the National Meet please note that the egg contest rules were updated by the board in December 2020 to allow for members to exhibit up to three entries of 6 eggs each in each class of the two egg classes of bantam and large fowl. Prior to December 2020 the limit was two entries, per member, in the two classes. Hopefully, this update of the rules will lead to even more competition for the egg contest. The awards for the National Meet may be found in the newsletter and on the club forum.

The judges for the National Meet are Matt Lhamon for bantams and Brian Gates for large fowl. Mark October 16th on your calendar and get ready for the National Meet! I am looking forward to seeing everyone there.

Some of you may follow Kenny Troiano who writes a regular column for Poultry Press, and author of several poultry books, and is also the founder of the Breeders Academy. Kenny also does audio podcasts, and recently did one with our member Royce Van Blaricome of Washington state. It runs well over an hour, and a lot of time is spent discussing Ameraucana breeding. You can skip ahead or back in 30 second increments to get to the interview, which starts at about the 8-minute mark. On a personal note, as I have returned to Ameraucana breeding I have renewed my personal struggle with hatchability. I have good fertility that is greater than 90% at days 7-10 when I candle, so I know it is not a rooster problem. I am sure some of my fellow club members may also have hatchability issues and I thought it might be good to share my strategies for this spring.

The first thing I am doing is I have upped my incubator and hatcher sanitation to see if I have something growing that I do not know about which is causing the hatchability issues during the second part of incubation. I brushed on this topic at the Southern National seminar/Q&A last fall and took away some hints to try. I am not fully convinced that I have sanitation issues, but I am taking extra steps to not only clean, but then sanitize.

The second thing I am doing is that I have changed my breeder feed and I am using a micro/macro nutrient supplement. I am seeing some definite activity/health improvements in the last three weeks of use with my test pens as I am writing this report. Of course, the brutally cold weather here in central Missouri and the associated challenges has impacted egg production. I am thinking that by the end of March or early April I will have an idea if the change to the breeder feed and the use of the micro/macro nutrient supplement helps hatchability. I personally believe this may be the issue given that I am running a control group of chickens that are in a chicken tractor at night, but free range during the day. The eggs I have set from that pen have had 95% fertility and 90% hatchability. I believe I may just not have access to a good quality breeder feed locally.

All that being said, I tend to have humidity issues also and I try to manage them the best I can given Missouri's swings in humidity.

One also must consider the age of the pullet/hen that produced the eggs. Old hens (like some of mine) and young pullets sometimes have egg hatchability issues.

The other consideration could be inbreeding which brings forth the good and the bad in the genetics of a line. If the eggs are not hatching due to some sort of genetic issue, it is a good thing that they are not hatching. It is the teasing out as to "why" the eggs are not hatching that is a challenge. I doubt that the hatchability issues I am seeing may be related inbreeding given where I am in the breeding program for all my Ameraucana except my black large fowl Ameraucana.

My line of black large fowl Ameraucana came from a person in Kansas who was raising them for pastured eggs to supply local restaurants with a focus on egg production in the breeding program for the line which was what attracted me to them. The original birds were a combination of birds from several well-known Ameraucana breeders from about 15 years ago. After that they had been bred as a closed flock and selected for egg laying and then type.

I have had the birds for a while, but due to personal circumstances mentioned above had not hatched any chicks from them in 3 years since getting them. I knew what I had were mostly siblings and that chicks I would produce would be the result of an initial inbreeding step. The birds age was not on my side and I decide last year to hatch as many as I could from the line because the productivity clock was running down for the hens. The hatchability was decent last year at about 75% from hens that were at a minimum three years old. I hatched three sets of offspring types from all the hatches last season. About a 20% of the chicks had crooked beaks, "owl face," or crooked toes as they developed. About 60% showed all kinds of silver and gold leakage both male and female. The final 20% turned out to be genuinely nice with about half of that 20% being really nice in type and confirmation. That set of the final 20% that are really nice pullets are being bred back to their father this year and the cockerels are going back the best of the old hens. I will be

interested to see how this year's birds turn out and what I see as defects turning up. At first, I was pretty upset with last year's results, but then after thinking about it, visiting with fellow club member Royce Van Blaricome, and listening to a few Kenny Troiano podcasts, I realized the inbreeding was forcing the bad genes to show themselves so that I can get rid of them. So, I am being brave and looking to the future with my black large fowl!

I hope everyone's hatching season goes well and that you have many bouncy chicks to entertain you soon!

Hi everyone, Hopefully by the time you read this your hatching season will be in full swing. Here in Utah I likely won't get started until after our show here the second week of March.

I did get the opportunity to attend the Pacific Poultry Breeders Association's Spring show which was an APA/ABA national meet. It was by far the largest show I have attended to date. There were 1,538 total birds entered from 156 exhibitors. 54 entries in the AOSB class and 74 entries in the AOCCL class. The Ameraucana breed was very well represented in both classes winning Champion AOSB/BB/BV (Black Cockerel), Reserve AOSB (Black Pullet), Junior Champion AOSB/RB/RV (Black Pullet), and Junior Champion AOCCL (Black hen). A wheaten pullet shown by myself took BB & BV in the bantam Ameraucana and a black cockerel shown by Clint Carter took RB & RV in the bantams.

The next show that I am looking to attend is my "local" Utah Fancy Poultry Association show on March 11-13 and then on to CO for the Colorado Poultry Association show on April 9 & 10.





Hopefully Covid restrictions will continue to loosen nationwide and we can get back to this fancy that we all adore.
